

Picture perfect retreat

Hop in the car and make tracks to the mountain for a weekend of fine food, wines and surrounds you'll want to bring home, writes Cathy Finch

I AM drowning in a double spa bath oozing bubbles. All around me I feel nature at my door. My bathroom is a glassed oasis that draws the outdoors in. Even the ceiling is glass, allowing me to gaze up at the towering rose gums roaring in the wind that rocks their branches.

My bed rests in a cosy stone gable cottage where an indoor fireplace crackles, port and chocolate is set out on the table and the smell of freshly baked bread seeps from a cloth-draped basket. Across the road is an ancient, twisted rainforest where water tumbles and glow-worms shine.

Witches Falls Cottages are perched high above city worries near the edge of Mt Tamborine escarpment, 50 minutes' drive south of Brisbane. It was recently reopened as an enhanced escape for couples, and I get the

feeling owners David and Daniela enjoy nothing more than extending the finer elements of eating and relaxing.

In the morning as the smell of chimney smoke wafts through the mountain air, the forest fairies deliver breakfast outside my door. A hamper overflows with fresh fruit, yoghurt, cereal, smoked ham and cheeses, juices and the most amazing-smelling loaf of freshly baked bread. The following morning we opt for German sausages, eggs, bacon, tomatoes and mushroom to barbecue in our private courtyard amid flowering camellias, with kookaburras and lorikeets overhead.

Outside there is much to explore in Queensland's oldest national park, spread over the Tamborine plateau and surrounding foothills.

We start across the road with the 3.lkm Witches Falls Circuit, passing over Fenwick

Creek that falls from cliffs of basalt columns into lush palm groves below. The walk to Curtis Falls and back is only L5km through some of the prettiest rainforest you are likely to encounter and there are many more trails to choose from that will journey you into the heart of nature.

When the green in me is saturated I turn to shopping and short blacks at Gallery Walk, the hub of al fresco cafes, antique, craft, art and trinket shops. There are also several wineries not to be missed.

At Cedar Creek Estate Vineyard and Winery we lunch on duckling tangelo roast breast of duck with ginger, glazed with tangelo syrup and served with Asian

vegetables. Out on a wooden deck we sip wine to the light strums of a guitar and look out over a quiet lake (dug by owner John, himself — said to be his penance for shooting ducks when he was younger).

Far more than just a cellar door and popular wedding venue, this charming winery also provides an opportunity

to see thousands of glowworms in purpose-built underground caves.

Back in town, Witches Falls Winery also shines when I find part-owner Richard thighhigh in an open fermenter, ensuring his "hand made" wines are correctly trod. I fall for the Granite Belt Shiraz that shows inky blackcurrant and cinnamon aromas on the nose, but admit I still do think about Richard's toes.

Perhaps the newest and most exciting addition to the mountain is the opportunity to capture its beauty more professionally on a Bluedog Photography workshop and retreat.

Nick Lancaster, together with visiting tutors, will help you transform your impossible rainforest flops into dramatic images with flair.


GO North Tamborine is about 50 minutes' drive south of Brisbane.
